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Introduction

This resource was developed as a support guide to assist with the basic fundamentals of cursive writing. Cursive Writing is a life skill that many adults use in their daily life and it is essential to develop a legible signature. Adults who know how to read and write in cursive writing will be prepared for everyday activities.

What is Cursive Writing:

Cursive writing was a way to write quickly before the use of computers. In this style of hand writing, the letters are connected so the writer does not need to to lift the pen from the paper.

Learners are introduced to printing and penmanship skills in the early grades of school. Cursive Writing is no longer included in the curriculum for many reasons, including an increase in technology. Learning cursive writing is an important skill and research indicates that handwriting engages the brain in more ways than typing on a keyboard. Cursive should not be forgotten as it is still an essential skill.

Purpose of Cursive Writing:

What is the purpose of learning Cursive Writing skills in today's environment?

Reading and writing in cursive handwriting remains an important life skill. Many people like family members, teachers, employers, and supervisors still use cursive writing. There are many store signs, logos, and historical documents that use cursive writing. Most importantly, you may be required to write your signature.

Your Signature:

A signature is your name written in a distinctive way as a form of identification. This may include full names or initials (an initial is the first letter of the name).

Sample signatures may include:

- 1. First name, last name
- 2. First name, middle initial, last name
- 3. First initial, and last name
- 4. All initials

Writing your signature in cursive makes it difficult to copy and thus preferred on documents. A signature is required for signing legal/government documents, forms, or applications including

licences, health cards, credit cards, bank applications, work related contracts, or signing up for a membership at your local gym.

Basic Fundamentals of Cursive Writing

This resource will teach learners to have a comfortable and appropriate pen grip, posture, and attitude towards handwriting. It will provide worksheets to help learners become comfortable with the movement of cursive writing. It will illustrate the correct movement associated with each letter and the correct formation of each letter. It will also include the correct technique for joining letters and the flow and fluency of writing words. The words included in worksheets are associated with Indigenous culture to provide a connection to our writing. Practice, practice, practice.

Understanding Skills for Success

What are Skills for Success in Canada?



Length of Unit:

10 Lessons

Previous Learning Required by Learners:

Learners should be able to write using the printed alphabet.

Writing Cursive Unit Outline:

- Lesson 1 Introduction to techniques and materials.
- Lesson 2 Warm-up: mastering the movements of tails, strokes, and loops. Worksheets included.
- Lesson 3 Demonstrate the correct movement and formation of letters A to Z. Worksheets included.
- Lesson 4 Printed and cursive letter comparison. Includes practice with lowercase and capital letters with words. (worksheets included). Each lesson will review the correct movement and formation of letter and illustrate joining letters for flow and fluency.

- Lesson 6 Cursive Writing Tips and Assessment and Evaluation checklist

Lesson One: Introduction to Techniques and Materials

Lesson Topic: Discuss and explain why learning cursive writing is important. The techniques and materials required for cursive writing will also be taught during this lesson.

- OALCF: to interpret documents using cursive writing
- Understand the importance of cursive writing as an important life skill. Importance of a person's signature.
- Understand techniques and the materials required.

Introduction:

• Introduce topic of cursive writing: what is cursive writing, the purpose of cursive writing, and the importance of a person's signature.

Lesson 1: Techniques

Begin with Techniques

To begin writing in cursive, use a pencil or pen for a fluid line of ink when writing. There is a recommended technique to hold your pen, recommended paper position, and body position when writing.





PEN GRIP

Is important to enable the writer to move their fingers and control the pen.

PAPER POSITION

If the lerarner is right handed, the paper should be slanted towards the left and if they are left handed, the paper should be slanted towards the right.





BODY POSITION

The learner should be writing at a desk with their feet on the floor, back upright inclined towards the desk, and with forearms resting on desk

Task Objective:

The learner will begin with a sample of their name, facilitators will write each learners name for them to copy and practice. Or provide printable tracing worksheet for names.

Lesson Two: Warm Up and Cursive Letters A-Z

Expectations:

- OALCF: to write continuous text in cursive writing
- OALCF: to express oneself creatively using cursive writing
- to understand that everyone has their own writing style
- to understand the proper technique of each cursive letter of the alphabet

Materials and Equipment:

- Pen and lined paper
- Cursive Writing worksheet with tails and loops practice (Pg. 11)
- Cursive Handwriting Techniques worksheet (Pg. 12-13)
- Cursive Handwriting Alphabet worksheet (Pg.14)

Instructional Strategies:

Lecture/discussion, guided demonstration, learners trace letters on practice sheet, or video

Introduction:

<u>Discuss</u>

Each person has a unique handwriting style. When learning to cursive write, learners can add their own style to letters.

Cursive Writing (warm up)

When connecting cursive letters together, there will be loops, flicks, and tails at the beginning and end of each letter. The tail is what connects each letter to letter.

Examples of Tails, Slanted Strokes, and Loops:

Sequence of Learning:

- Explain Tails and Loops (can be used as a warm up). Tails are the small curls at the end of a letter or the lines that connect letters together. Look at the previous page for an example. Loops are lines that intersect to form a loop. Look at the previous page for an example.
- Provide the practice sheet: Cursive Writing worksheet tails and loops (pg. 11)
- Explain how each cursive letter has a proper movement. See practice worksheet: Cursive Writing Technique worksheet (pg. 12-13)
- Demonstrate how each letter is written using proper movement and formation
- Practice Cursive Handwriting Alphabet worksheet (pg. 14)

Task Objective:

Learners will begin learning the cursive alphabet. They will practice loops and tails before moving onto the capital letter and lower case letters. Have learners trace each of the letters then practice individually.

Lesson Three: Review Cursive Letters A-Z

Expectations:

- OALCF: to write continuous text in cursive writing
- OALCF: to express oneself creatively using cursive writing
- To understand the proper technique of each cursive letter of the alphabet. See the Cursive Handwriting Techniques worksheet.

Materials and Equipment:

- Pen and lined paper
- Cursive Handwriting Techniques Wooksheet (pg. 12-13)
- Cursive Handwriting Alphabet worksheet (pg. 14)

Instructional Strategies:

Lecture/discussion, guided demonstration or video, or learners can trace letters

Introduction:

- Review demonstration of cursive letters
- Youtube video to demonstrate each cursive letterhttps://www.youtube.com/watch?v=iTF0AhQjU0k
- Reminder of having own writing style

Sequence of Learning:

- Explain how each cursive letter has a proper technique
- Demonstrate how each letter is written with the cursive writing technique worksheet

Task Objective:

Learners will practice each of the letters. Using the Cursive Handwriting Techniques Wooksheet (pg. 12-13) practice each capital letter and small letter. Begin by tracing each of the letters and then practice letters individually.

Lesson Four: Printed Letters Compared to Cursive Letters

Each lesson learners will review the correct movement and formation of letters and illustrate how to join letters.

Lesson Topic:

Printed letters compared to cursive Letters. Practice words in cursive and include the printed letter next to the cursive letter. This will benefit learners by helping them read cursive writing.

Expectations:

- OALCF: to assist to read continuous text in cursive writing documents
- OALCF: to interpret documents in cursive text
- OALCF: to interact with others using cursive writing
- OALCF: to express oneself creatively in cursive writing
- To understand the similarities and differences between the printed penmanship and cursive letters of the alphabet
- Practice writing words in cursive

Materials and Equipment:

- Pen and lined paper
- Cursive Writing Practice worksheets (printed and cursive letter)

Instructional Strategies:

Guided demonstration or learners can trace sample cursive words

Introduction:

- Explain how viewing the printed letter next to the cursive letter assists in reading and writing cursive letters and words
- Explain where to join letters together to form words

Sequence of Learning:

- Review demonstration of cursive letters
- Youtube video to demonstrate each cursive letterhttps://www.youtube.com/watch?v=iTF0AhQjU0k
- Reminder of having own writing style
- Explain how each printed letter is similar or different to each cursive letter. Provide practice sheets with printed and cursive words for each letter, this will help in reading and provide cursive practice
- Explain how letters are joined together when creating words

<u>NOTE</u>

The practice worksheets model the words and show how the letters are joined together to create the words. Learners must understand that the dotted line indicates the middle of the line and when writing on lined paper, letters and words are much smaller

Task Objective

Learners will practice writing words that start with different letters of the alphabet. They will use the practice sheet to trace words and then practice writing words on lined paper.



Lesson Five: Signatures and Initials

TIPS FOR CURSIVE WRITING

- 1. Lowercase letters are all the same size.
- 2. Capital Letters can be different types and styles.
- 3. Keep it neat when joining letters.
- 4. Practice warm-up drills with slants, loops, and tails
- 5. Letter O and U and V have only one stroke
- 6. Avoid writing fast, flow and be neat.
- 7. Don't press too hard when writing, have a relaxed grip.
- 8. Practice on lined paper.
- 9. Embrace your OWN Style.
- 10. Practice, practice, practice


