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# Introduction to Employment Services

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


### Overview

Are you currently searching for a job? Are you searching online? There are many resources available to you such as:

- Government of Canada Job Bank service
- provincial services like Employment Ontario
- local employment centres in municipalities across Canada
- private employment service providers

But there are also some risks to be aware of. Job search scams are becoming more common. According to the Better Business Bureau, job searchers have lost billions of dollars to scammers. Experts agree that job search scams are growing.



The best ways to avoid job search scams:

- learning the difference between honest work opportunities and scams
- being sure the company advertising the job is real
- making sure the wages offered are reasonable

This resource will teach you how to avoid job search scams. It will provide examples of common job search scams. It will give you the chance to practice spotting scams on your own. Let's get started!

### **Common Job Search Scams**

Below we will look at common job search scams and practice spotting them.

#### **Fake Job Listings**

The first job search scam to watch for is fake job listings. Fake job listings are designed to attract job searchers with flashy information and big promises. Some things to watch out for to avoid fake job postings:

- a. **No company name**: you can't verify that the company is real.
- b. Wide salary range: top pay is much higher than the lowest.
- c. Many unspecific job openings: you're not sure what the job is.
- d. Too good to be true:
- higher than normal pay
- o no experience required
- o or there are too many perks
- e. No experience required: the job could seem suited to anyone.



These ads could be trying to steal your information or put a virus on your computer: never click an unknown link like this!



### Fake Cheque Scams

Fake cheque scams are becoming very common. They can result in job searchers losing a lot of money. Fake cheque scams work in a few simple steps:

- a job searcher is hired for a job
- they are told that they will need some equipment for work

Before you start work, you will receive a payment(check) which will be used to set up your workspace by purchasing the office equipment and software needed to start your training and work.

#### Shortly, you will be receiving your Employment Offer Letter

- they are sent a cheque to cover the cost of the equipment
- they are told to deposit the cheque and then transfer the money to a company that will provide the equipment
- the cheque "bounces," which means:
  - $\circ$  the sender never had enough money to cover the cost of the cheque
  - o the bank will take the money out of your account
  - o you will have lost the cost of the equipment

In fake cheque scams, the company is set up for the scam. It's just a way for scammers to get money from you. **Never** use a cheque sent to you by a new employer to purchase equipment.



### **Phishing Email**

Phishing email job scams are emails that you receive inviting you to apply for a job. Sometimes they will try to hook you by telling you you are perfect for the job. Or by saying that the job opening must be filled urgently. Other red flags to watch for:

- a. Ad tries to pressure you by saying it is urgent.
- b. Email is not connected to the company.
- c. Pay is too high for the hours and position (too good to be true).

This type of scam may be trying to steal your personal information. That could lead to identity fraud:

Identity fraud is when someone steals your personal information to commit a crime or steal your money.

**Do not** respond to these emails. And **never** send your personal information to unknown sources.



### Data Entry Scams

Data entry jobs have become more and more important in the digital age. Data entry jobs involve recording information into computers and data processing programs. These jobs could involve:

- tracking and entering invoices
- transcribing data from recordings
- entering information from various sources into programs

But scammers have also been targetting people looking for data entry jobs. Watch the video below to learn how data entry scams work, the dangers, and how to spot them:

### **Online Reshipping Scams**

In online reshipping scams, people are hired to receive packages at their home and resend them. Sometimes the victim will be asked to test or repackage the items:

As a Packing Inspector youneed to receive customer's orders which will be delivered to your home address by UPS, FedEX or USPS. The orders will be coming from stores like Amazon, BestBuy, Walmart, Zappos and others. Usually people order apparel, accessories, small appliances, a lot of electronics, basically whatever they can get cheaper in the US than in their countries.

You need to check all the items against the invoices, check them for any kind of damages, make pictures, make copies of paperwork, report the packages, get them prepared for shipment and then ship them mostly to our hubs from where we ship internationally by sea and by air. Rush orders may be shipped internationally by you.

Here's how it works:

- The items that the victim is asked to ship might be illegal.
- The items might be **stolen** or purchased using **stolen** credit cards.
- The victim might be asked to fill out forms and their personal information may be stolen.
- They will not be paid for the work they have done.
- They could be in trouble with the police.

Most of these jobs will not be called "Online Reshipper" in the ads. Notice that the ad above calls the job "Packing Inspector."

> Avoid jobs that involve re-mailing packages from unknown sources.



## Tips for Avoiding Job Search Scams

Now that you have a better sense of the common job search scams, let's go back over some of the strategies to avoid them.

- 1. Always double check the company who is hiring:
  - o find them online
  - o contact them by phone or email if in doubt
  - o check that the email contacts match the company (not just gmail or yahoo)
- It is a red flag to receive a job offer for a job you didn't apply for:
  if you receive an email offering you a job you didn't apply for, it's likely a scam.
- 3. **NEVER** pay your employer for anything until you are sure it is a real job: scams might ask you to pay for applying, training, or equipment.
- 4. Be wary of strange contact methods:
  - o usually job contacts by text message are suspicious
  - o also watch for email addresses that don't belong to the company
- 5. Too good to be true usually is. Red flags include:
  - o pay that is higher than normal for the job
  - jobs that are overly flexible
  - o jobs that require no experience (unless it is an entry level job)
  - jobs descriptions that seem open to everyone
